○ Brain injury is the leading cause of death and disability in young people. Of all types of injury, those to the brain are among the most likely to result in death or permanent disability.^{1,2}

○ Approximately **1 million** people living in the UK have suffered from an acquired brain injury.³

○ Road traffic accidents account for **50%** of all **traumatic** brain injuries. Other major causes include falls, sports related injury and assaults. Infection, disease and stroke also cause a large number of acquired brain injuries.⁴

UKABIF are working with other parties to improve the quality and accuracy of statistics about acquired brain injury. Gathering accurate data about acquired brain injury is problematic for the following reasons:

- Statistics are often based upon the presenting diagnosis at A&E.
- Where data is accurate often only traumatic injuries are recorded leaving out the injuries caused by problems such as infection
- Trusts differ in their classification systems regarding acquired brain injury

What is acquired brain injury?

Acquired Brain Injury (ABI) is non-degenerative injury to the brain that has occurred after birth. It includes traumatic brain injuries - such as open or closed head injuries and non-traumatic brain injuries - such as those caused by some strokes, infectious diseases, lack of oxygen to the brain, metabolic disorders and toxic products taken into the body. A brain injury can be life-changing for the individual and their family, with effects upon relationships, cognitive and physical abilities, emotions and health.

How does UKABIF achieves its goals?

Our work is varied and ranges from collating information about acquired brain injury and preparing publications to organising conferences and supporting the development of local ABI groups. We work closely with policy makers ensuring that they have up to date information about service provision and the needs of people with ABI.

UKABIF is a membership organisation and believes that by bringing together all parties with an interest in ABI we have a stronger voice. Our members include:

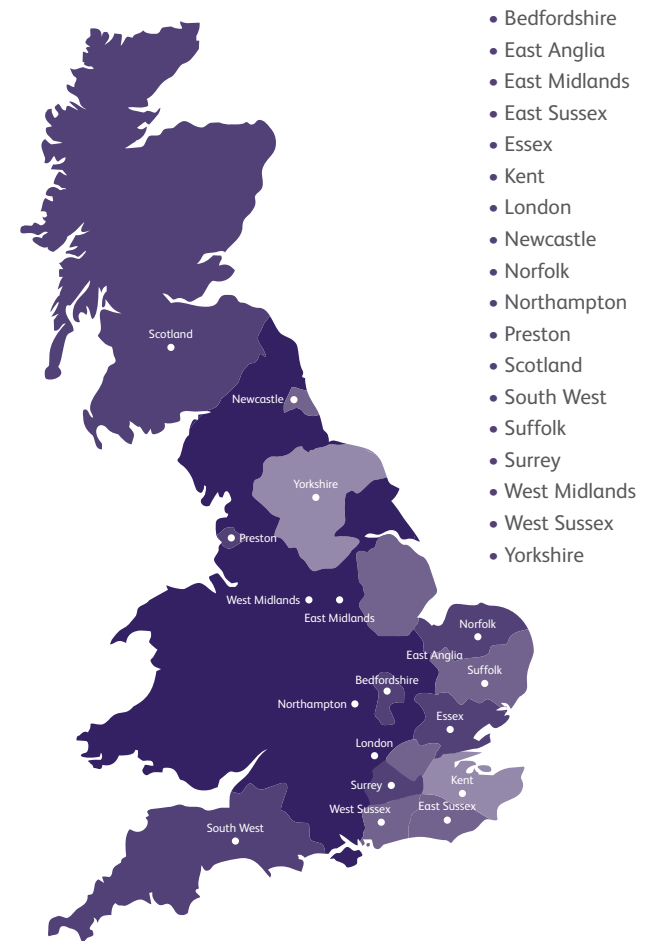
